

# September

September was the beginning of our Blue Coat Forest School adventure. The first thing we needed to do was establish a set of rules that would keep everyone safe and enhance the Forest School experience.

Here are our Forest School rules:

- Walk around the fire circle (not through it)
- Only enter the fire circle if you are invited to by Mrs. Dunbar
- Stay in the pink ribbons
- Always walk in the forest and look where you are going
- Keep fingers away from mouths and eyes





Setting up the forest area was the next challenge. Mrs. Dunbar sourced lots of logs so we could make a seated circle for everyone to sit around. We then set up a fire pit so that this circle became our Fire Circle.







The pebbles we collected in the forest were great for making patterns and pictures.

We spent time exploring the forest area. If we found anything interesting we added them to the weaving frame ...

October





October brought a wonderful array of colours to the forest. We had fun matching the colours to our colour charts.





We made our own Autumn crowns, using the most colourful leaves we could find on the forest floor.

A little rain didn't stop our enjoyment in Forest School. Mrs. Dunbar put up a shelter. We enjoyed sheltering under it and pushing all the fallen leaves off the top of it!



### November



The forest really changed in November and all the children noticed the different colours that were emerging. A walk up to the top of our 'hill' meant that we could enjoy all the beautiful Autumn colours.



We made beautiful pictures on the forest floor using the different coloured leaves we could find.



Year One learnt about the need to feed our wildlife in the winter months and made food for the birds that visit our forest.



Year Two had been reading the story of Stickman by Julia Donaldson. We read the story in the forest and enjoyed a visit from Stickman himself! We also enjoyed making our own Stickmen.





Reception celebrated Bonfire Night by having a fire! We learnt about how to keep safe around fire and the important words 'Stop, drop and roll'. Our sparklers were made from twigs we found in the forest. Mrs. Ingram came to our bonfire too!









December came and so did the snow. The forest changed a lot and we enjoyed making footprints with our wellies in the fresh snow.











Our Christmas challenge was to make a tree using twigs. We had to make sure the twigs were different lengths so it looked like a proper Christmas tree. Once we were back in the classroom, we added glitter so that we didn't leave any mess on the forest floor.



During the cold December month, we learnt about how some animals hibernate for the winter. In the forest, we made some homes for our toy animals like Harry the Hedgehog.

Godly Play in the forest allowed the children time to reflect on the crucifixion and resurrection.








April
