Industrial Revolution		 The invention of machines that could make things much more quickly started the Industr Revolution. Britain became known as 'the workshop of the world.' The Victorians completely changed the way towns and cities looked. Lots of people left th countryside to find work. The Victorians built factories, houses, schools, hospitals, libraries, theatres, bridges, static and shops. 			
Children	1	 At the start of Victoria's reign, only wealthy children went to school because you had to pay for it. Poorer children were sent out to work and never learnt to read and write. They had to work long hours in very dangerous places like factories, mills and mines where they were often beaten, badly injured or even killed. 			
Standard of living		 As change happened so quickly, lots of poor families would have to share a small house. This led to overcrowded and filthy areas called slums. Diseases would often breakout. Workhouses were formed for the very poor. There was a huge difference between the lives of the rich and poor.
