




The Accidental Prime Minister – Tom McLaughlin


Good Night Stories for Rebel Girls – Elena Favilli & Francesca Cavallo


The BFG – Roald Dahl


How to train your Dragon – Cressida Cowell


The Borrowers – Mary Norton


My Brother is a Superhero – David Solomons


Midnight for Charlie Bone – Jenny Nimmo


The Math Inspectors – Daniel Kenney & Emily Boever


Rent a Bridesmaid – Jacqueline Wilson
