How do I produce art like Rousseau?


Step 1: Take a pencil and lightly draw the objects in your landscape, e.g. trees, bushes, the horizon and the animals.

Henri Rousseau was a famous French painter. He was born in 1844 in Western France.

At school Henri won lots of prizes for drawing.

He is best known for his jungle scenes, such as a Tiger in Tropical storm (surprised!) .



Rousseau did not visit the jungle to see the animals, instead he visited the greenhouses in Paris at the Botanical gardens to copy plants.




