Key Vocabulary

Word	Meaning
Portrait	A piece of artwork showing a person.
Self Portrait	A portrait that an artist creates of themselves.
Facial Features	Eyes, nose, mouth, lips, eye-brows, freckles etc
Represent	How an artist shows what a person is like in a portrait.
Tone	The lightness or darkness of something.
Highlights	Where the light is strongest on an object.
Shadows	Darker areas where there is less light on an object

Vincent Van Gogh

Was a Dutch painter who is among the most famous artists to have ever lived.



He is most famous for paintings such as Sun-flower, The Starry Night and his Self por-traits.

He experimented with the use of colour in his painting and often used vivid colours to depict landscapes.

Knowledge

A portrait is a painting or a photograph of a persons face and its expression. The purpose of a **portrait** is to show the likeness, personality or even the mood of a person. For this reason, in photography, a portrait is actually not a snapshot, but a calm image of a person in a still position. A portrait normally shows a person looking directly at the painter or photographer,

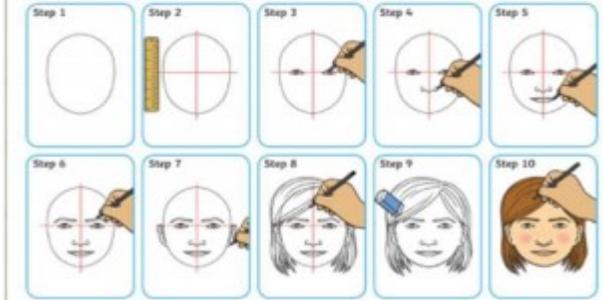
A self-portrait is a picture of the artist drawing it. The earliest example of a **self-portrait** made was Jan Van Eyck in 1433. One of the most famous self-portrait painters was **Vincent Van Gogh**. He painted a picture of himself 37 times from 1886 to 1889.



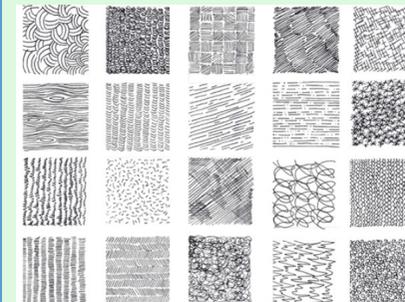
